Jerod Impichch<u>a</u>achaaha' Tate

Chickasaw ~ b1968

Jerod Impichchaachaaha' Tate was born in 1968 in Norman, Oklahoma and is a citizen of the Chickasaw Nation.

Mr. Tate is dedicated to the development of American Indian classical composition, and a recent review by The Washington Post states that "Tate's connection to nature and the human experience was quite apparent in this piece... rarer still is his ability to effectively infuse classical music with American Indian nationalism." Tate has received numerous commissions and his works have been performed by the National Symphony Orchestra, Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra, Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Colorado Ballet, to name a few.

Louis W. Ballard

Cherokee/Quapaw ~ 1931-2007

Louis W. Ballard was born near Quapaw, Oklahoma, in the Native American Indian community of Devil's Promenade. He was recognized as a preeminent American composer, music educator and author of Cherokee-Quapaw, French and Scottish heritage. As a composer, music educator and award winning music journalist, Louis W. Ballard was devoted to the values of Native American culture and music. His Ballard Credo states: "It is not enough to acknowledge that Native American Indian Music is merely different from other music. What is needed in America is an awakening and reorienting of our total spiritual and cultural perspectives to embrace, understand and learn from the Aboriginal American what motivates his musical and artistic impulses."

Celeste Lansing

Celeste Lansing took part in the Native American Composers Apprenticeship Project (NACAP). Founded in 2001, the NACAP is an outreach program of the Grand Canyon Music Festival that is dedicated to teaching Native American young people to compose concert music. Each year, young musicians work with a Native American composer and a string quartet in residence in partnership with their school's music program. Raven Chacon serves as Composer-in-Residence at NACAP (more below).

Raven Chacon is known as a composer of chamber music as well as a solo performer of experimental 'noise music'. As an enrolled member of the Navajo Nation, he is also one of the few American Indian classical composers and educators of "New Native Art." Chacon and Celeste Lansing's efforts with the Native American Composer Apprenticeship Project have gained the program recognition from the National Arts and Humanities Youth Program, which included a recent ceremony at the White House with First Lady Michelle Obama.
